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We have a nice large edition this month, we articles about the CB re-union weekend, the CSMA Old Warden visit and a strange motorbike, courtesy of Mike Harrison and Ian O'Connor.

From the people who brought you the "new" Ford Escorts comes this next venture, as they are reviving the MG Metro 6R4 for 2024 as a high performance carbon fibre rally recreation, with around 450bhp on tap from an Audi supplied V6 engine. The model will be powered by a 3 litre V6 engine with power upped to 450bhp, compared to the standard 350bhp output, and power will be sent to both axles through a six speed sequential gearbox. The company will build just five cars in 2024, each priced from £295,000 before taxes, and buyers can choose from a road focused setup, with a bespoke interior, or a 'lightweight' version for race and rally activities.



The August grass autotest is now a go and will take place at the new venue at Marsworth, near Tring. Hopefully we will find that the venue is very suitable for our needs, but we will be making it up as we go

along for the first event. We will have to see what they think about us using it again, after the first event happens, so September and October will have to stay provisional dates at the moment.

The recent WRC rally in Estonia was another win for Kalle Rovanpera, only his second of the year mind, in a dominant performance, winning every stage on Saturday and Sunday, with only Ott Tanak getting other stage wins. Tanak was severely hindered by getting a five minute penalty before the start, when the team had to change his engine after a problem on the shakedown stage, but he did recover to eighth place. The Two Brewers entries suffered a bit from the bad weather leading up to the event, but was actually OK on the night when driving around. A bit of a shame for the 40th edition. As Mike says in his article, a move of location may make the change a good opportunity to revitalise the event. If you have any thoughts on how the event may be improved, please let us know.

Action in the Hungarian F1 race was limited to the places behind Verstappen, who finished over 30 seconds ahead of the rest of the field. Although Hamilton put his Mercedes on pole, he was down to fourth by the second corner and it was the McLaren team who now seem to have moved up to second best, with Lando Norris getting his second second podium in a row.

In the World Rallycross championship, a new team for this year is the Special ONE Racing, which has Sebastien Loeb driving an all electric Lancia Delta Evo-e RX. With 500kW (equivalent to 680bhp) under the bonnet and four wheel drive, it is capable of accelerating from 0-62mph in an eye-watering 1.8 seconds – faster even than Formula 1...

The Curtis Bennett Rally Reunion Weekend May 12-14th 2023

The CB Rally was the CSMA's premier rally and ran for over 70 years from 1935 to 2007, except for the war years of WW2 and the foot and mouth outbreak of 2001. For forty-four of those years, it was based at the Metropole Hotel in Llandrindod Wells.

In May, as part of the CSMA centenary celebrations, a reunion was held at the Metropole with a scenic drive using some of the classic rally roads and a dinner was organised on the Saturday by Allan Goddard and Alan Smith, followed by a walking treasure hunt around the town on the Sunday morning, by Malcolm and Madeleine Grubb.

Ann and I took the Sprite up on the Friday on the trailer behind the Audi, as on the Sunday, we were going to drive across to Snetterton and stay the night in a hotel, before taking part in a Track Day at Snetterton Race Circuit on the Monday. If you look at a map, you simply head east from Llandrindod Wells!

Having booked into the hotel around 4pm on the Friday, we then enjoyed a drink at the bar and an excellent meal, after which Allan and Alan gave a good briefing on the main event which would start after breakfast the next morning.

We had a lovely drive up in sunshine on the Friday and the Saturday proved to be no different, allowing us to drive all day with the roof down in the Sprite, making the day so much better, given the fantastic roads and awe-inspiring views we were to enjoy on route.

Twenty two cars took part in the event and the first car was flagged away from the hotel car park just after 10 o'clock and using a tulip road book, we first headed off on the A483 towards Builth Wells, through Howey and then on towards Pontnewydd and then into New Bridge, where we turned left towards Rhayader on the A470 and then on off on the B4358 to Beulah.

In Beulah we turned right to Llandovery, on the A483 once more, and then on to Abergwesyn, which was one of the favourite roads often used on the rally. And before you ask, no, I didn't recognise any of it, as back then on the rally it was pitch black with only the spotlights to show the way! Anyway, this is a superb road and includes the Devil's Staircase, which is a particularly steep section with very tight hairpins.

Needless to say, this is exactly where we encountered cyclists attempting to peddle up the steep incline, which meant we had to stop and with the hand brake not holding, we very nearly burnt the clutch out, and cyclists were not my favourite people that morning shall we say. The picture of the Sprite at this location doesn't really give a true impression of the steepness of the road.

From here we travelled through Ceredigion, Tregaron, Pontrhydfendigaid and Ysbyty Ystwyth to the lunch time halt at Devils Bridge, where the Vale of Rheidol Railway terminates.



The lovely maroon Austin 7 parked in the railway car park was not one of the entries, I just thought it was a fantastic looking car, although given the lack of horse power, I would not have liked to have driven it over the roads we had driven that morning!

After lunch we all headed off to Cwmystwyth and on to Powys, down the Elan Valley past the disused metal mines, again this was one of the best routes and often used on the CB Rally, with its three dams and three reservoirs, it was always a very entertaining stretch of road, especially at night in the dark and was often used as a selective to ensure there was a winner! At the end of the valley we pulled into the visitor's centre and had a well-earned ice cream.

After the ice cream break we headed off once more and travelled into Rhayader, where we went straight through the town towards Leominster on the A44, eventually turning right at the roundabout at Cross Gates, to head back to Llandrindod Wells to the finish at the Metropole Hotel, having travelled some 46.6 miles in the morning run and a further 38 miles in the afternoon.

In the evening we had a very nice meal again, followed by a short quiz and Alan asked those of us who had competed on the CB, to give recollections of the event, after which we all have a good old chat and a beer in the bar afterwards.

On the Sunday morning, after a very good breakfast, Madeleine and Malcolm Grubb had organised one of their usual very good walking treasure hunts around the town. We were joined by Alan Smith on the hunt and despite having to cut short our walk, we still managed to come second.

That brought the event to a close and Ann and I headed off to Snetterton for a track day on the Monday, having had a very enjoyable weekend in Wales celebrating the Curtis Bennett Rally.

My thanks to AG and the rest of the organising team for an excellent weekend.

Classic Vehicle Group Centenary Run - Old Warden 2nd July 2023

To compliment the Boundless Centenary Event at Old Warden Aerodrome, the Classic Vehicle Group (CVG) had organised a display and car run, and members were given the choice of either driving straight to the event or taking part in a short run from the Leighton Buzzard Railway centre.

On the day, some fourteen cars elected to drive straight to the event, with the oldest car being a 1956 Austin Healey 100/4 and the youngest a 2016 Porsche Boxter. However, twenty of us decided to take part in the run, with the oldest car being a 1956 Volvo Amazon and the newest being a 2011 Mazda MX5 and this included a very nice black 1964 Velocette LE Mk 111 police bike.

Ann and I chose to take part in the run in the Sprite, arriving at the railway carpark for 9am in time for a coffee and the signing on, where a tulip road book and Goody Bag was given out. A short briefing took place at 9:45am with the first car leaving at around 10am. There was no set



timing on the event, but Pete Gregory who was responsible for the route and subsequent tulip road book, had ensured everyone had plenty of time to enjoy the Bedford countryside and still arrive in plenty of time at the airfield, to wander around the hangers and static displays before the main event of the day, the flying display.



This Centenary event proved to be very popular with members, as all of the free entry tickets soon sold out, but luckily the CVG Group had managed to have a number set aside for those of us taking part in the display and run.

Pete took us out of the station carpark turning right heading Northwards towards Hockliffe, crossing over the narrow-gauge railway and through newly built housing estates and then out into

the countryside towards Woburn and then through a deer park and on through Steppingley before turning left at a roundabout towards Millbrook.

Shortly after another roundabout, we turned right sign posted to Lidlington and after yet another roundabout, travelled over two level crossings (the full size one this time) and a couple more junctions before heading towards Houghton Conquest.

So far, the weather had been warm and bright, but not sunny, as the cloud cover was quite thick and it was windy at times, which we hoped would not impact on the flying display.



After yet more mini roundabouts, no we weren't in Milton Keynes!, we turned right at a tee junction towards Clophill and then took a tight hairpin left, signposted Haynes, before forking right to Ireland and then straight

on at a crossroads signposted Old Warden. Which indicated we were nearly at the end of the run!



After a few more junctions, we finally turned left, sign posted Shuttleworth College and after a short queue, our event car badge allowed us to bypass the main queuing system and we

were directed to the display and Boundless members' area,

having travelled just over 35 miles of really nice, deserted roads and beautiful Bedfordshire countryside.

So, having been shepherded to our parking spot next to a nice original AC Cobra, Ann and I left the Sprite to explore the collection of hangers and static displays. Most of the aircraft at the museum actually fly and with most of the aircraft parked outside on the field waiting to take part in the flying display, the hangers



were full of static displays and models, including some aircraft peddle cars which were a great hit with the kids!

Outside the hangers there was a nice collection of WW1 buses and WW1 and WW2 air force/army vehicles on display and of course many aircraft including a Gloster Gladiator and Westland Lysander, which are two of my favourite aircraft.

Included in the flying display were your normal Hurricane, Spitfire and Mustang and some very nice trainers and we were treated to a good

display from Sally B, which

is a B17 Flying Fortress based out of Duxford and numerous other aircraft. The display ended with a fine flypast by the RAF's memorial flight consisting of the Lancaster, Hurricane and Spitfire.

All in all, it was a great day out, with a great combination of classic cars and classic aircraft and as a bonus, even the weather was kind to us for once, with the forecasted showers holding off!

The ROKON - Ian O'Connor

While attending a car show near Thame recently, I came across this interesting scooter. Aimed at the US off-road bike/US Army market, it is the one and only two wheel drive bike I have ever seen (ED: They have tried 2WD on the Dakar rally). Visible to the front, below the front load rack, is the brake disc and chain drive shaft to the front wheel. Power comes to this transfer hub via a drive shaft with a universal joint allowing for power to be transmitted as the steering is turned. The engine is a fan cooled 208cc recoil started unit, with a 3 speed automatic gearbox. The owner was on hand to explain he knows of no other in the UK. He also told us about the range of accessories, including larger luggage rack, tow bar for a logging sledge or a two wheel trailer with the quoted towing capacity of 2000 pounds. The



factory options also include a side car for load moving or even stretcher carrying duties.



Standard feature are these chunky off-road tyres, on wheels that are an additional pair of tanks and can be used to carry extra fuel or even

water, subject to where the US Army choose to deploy them. Seen above the front shock absorber is the front brake disc, although I'm not sure how effective that would be stopping the bike fully loaded. Like a lot of Army kit, a simple loosen of the handle bars, lay them down, attach a parachute and then throw them out the back of a Hercules,

for use on the mission. If it lands in a lake or river, with a periscope air intake, they can be ridden almost totally submerged.

They have high ground clearance for riding over logs and boulders etc and according to the owner, it is almost unstoppable. Top speed is a reasonable 37 mph and it will never win any beauty contest.

July 2023 Update

Club Council Update

The Club Council met via Zoom for their 88th meeting on Tuesday 27th June.

Amongst their usual business the Club Council were pleased to hear that many Groups are doing well, whilst several others continue to struggle in attracting new members. However, a number of new initiatives are being planned to trial additional communications to new members regarding promoting Groups activities.

Another issue identified by the Club Council was the difficulties some Groups have in filling their 6 committee positions. As such, the Club Council have agreed to reduce the minimum number of committee members required to 4 (i.e. Group Leader/Chair, Group Secretary, Group Treasurer and one other Committee Member). The maximum number for Group committees remains at 9 members.

Club Treasurer, Geoff Gaunt outlined the proposals from the recent Expenses Sub-Committee meeting were to retain the current Recognising Volunteers funding, albeit with two minor amendments. Motorsports Curtis Bennett Reunion

In early May, over 40 of our Motorsports enthusiasts gathered in Llandrindod Wells, Mid-Wales to celebrate a reunion of one of our most prestigious Motoring events during our previous 100 years, the Curtis Bennett Rally.
