

At the NEL group AGM in March it was agreed that instead of having a group Christmas lunch this year we would have a New Year lunch. We can still treat it as a festive occasion although they will undoubtedly have taken the Christmas decorations down. We will still have the usual raffle and Heads and Tails game so bring along a little extra cash, any profit will go towards the gratuity for the staff. The Galley Hall, a country pub set in the Hertfordshire countryside to the North of Hoddesdon has its own car park, should this be full there is ample safe parking in the road outside.

By January you will probably have had enough Christmas Turkey so we are basing it on the Galley Hall's standard Sunday menu which offers a wide choice. Under the circumstances it will be difficult to offer a fixed price package so please make sure you complete the booking form carefully and accurately including noting down the correct price. For those used to ordering Chinese takeaways we have annotated a reference number per item, this will help us in checking that the correct items have been ordered. For the Traditional Roast, as well as the reference number, don't forget to state type of meat and regular or small. The Galley Hall Sunday menu is attached. The restaurant has a range of deserts which changes daily, should anyone still be hungry and in need of one of these they should be ordered and paid for separately along with any drinks ordered. I'm sure they will set up individual tabs should this be necessary. To be clear we will be responsible for paying pre ordered items on the booking form. Additional items must be paid for separately.

Bookings, accompanied by booking form and payment in full will be taken on a first come first serve basis. Booking forms, choice of menu and payment is required **to us** by the January club night, Tuesday 9th January, at the latest so that all arrangements can be coordinated and presented to the restaurant in time for the lunch. Payment can be payable by cheque, cash or bank transfer.

The Galley Hall building dates back to 1374 when it was then a farmhouse known as "Collewelle Haw", but by 1765 its name had evolved to the "Galley Hall". The Galley Hall became a Beer House during the 1830's being kept by one Benjamin Logsdale. The deeds were conveyed to Christie and Cathrow Brewers of Hoddesdon in 1837. Bringing us up to date the Pub has been extended in character to provide an extra Function and Patio Room area providing comfortable dining etc

Smart Meters and the electricity grid of the future

Mike is a friend who I have known for many years and has an avid interest in all things scientific. He was fortunate to be offered early retirement a few years ago from the Computer Dept of a major High St. bank. He felt life had been good to him and wanted to put something back. With his youthful exuberance he now teaches the use of computers to local Silver Surfers and is an active member of his local residents' association in Highams Park.

We have seen him before. He saved my embarrassment on our first Zoom club night at the start of Covid when I was due to give an audio-visual presentation and my equipment decided it didn't want to play. Luckily Mike was on line and stepped in to save the day with his fascinating talk on the Greenwich Meridian line and his explanation as to why the true Meridian line runs 102 metres to the East of what we generally recognise as the Greenwich Meridian line.

The last time we saw him was in 2021 with his talk on the Solar System. You may remember he had us all outside with a few of us stretched out about 100metres holding tiny objects to illustrate the scale of the Solar System.

This brings us to January's talk, **Smart meters and the electricity grid of the future**. In Mike's own words - There's more to smart meters than just automatically sending in your meter readings. How do they work? How will they and the "smart grid" help save the planet? What's the big plan? How will the grid cope with everyone charging cars at the same time? What's the future of power? With Mike's analytical brain we may be quite surprised at some of the information he will present to us.

## **150 YEARS OF RAILWAY IN CHINGFORD**

The Chingford Historical Society organised an event on 19 November to mark 150 years since the arrival of a railway in Chingford. The line which had been extended from Walthamstow in 1873 by the Eastern Counties Railway terminated at Bull Lane (now Kings Road) about a mile short of the existing station which was completed in 1878 as a precursor of an intention to further extend through Epping Forest to High Beech. However, this plan was scuppered by Queen Victoria who, following her visit by train to Chingford in 1882, declared that Epping Forest should remain open for the people of London to enjoy.

In the former station buffet there was a display of photographs of the line, including one of the arch that had been erected across the station forecourt to welcome Queen Victoria that remained there for many years afterwards. In addition to diagrams of the line throughout the ages there was a scale layout of the Temple Mills Marshalling Yard at Leyton where, as a young boy, I used to cycle to watch the shunting. It is now a Greater Anglia depot, previously used by Eurostar.

in central London.



An authentic nod to the past was the attendance of another heritage bus, now privately owned RT1702, which was blinded up for route 35. This was a marathon route from Clapham Common via London Bridge, Hackney, Leyton to Chingford Hatch that was extended on summer Sundays to Epping Forest and High Beech. Highams Park was a short working destination and buses used to do a U turn across The Broadway behind the bus to return southwards. Route 35 never did come across this level crossing - no bus service ever has - although it did cross the line further up at Chingford Hatch before an underpass was built.

A heritage bus, RTW75 of London Bus Co, gave rides into Epping Forest – this was the 8ft wide version of the RT Class and it is now laughable that, in the 1950's, the dinosaur jobsworths of the Met Police thought the extra 6inches width would bring the City to a halt and they banned their use

At Highams Park, the penultimate station, there was a Community Event in the approach road which was designed as a

family event with attractions and stalls.

I am sure Staff will remember the huge wooden gates that were closed and opened by the signalman in the box overlooking the level crossing on the left by turning an enormous wheel. With automatic signalling the box has been disused for many years, although a crepe bar opened for a while in it and there was a good view of the track below but the novelty faded and it sadly closed.

It was a pleasure to see so many people there enjoying the village atmosphere and I met up with several friends from the local area, including Bill and Pat who live just about half a mile away.

## November 2023 Update

## Association AGM – 1<sup>st</sup> November 2023

The Association AGM was held on Wednesday 1<sup>st</sup> November at the Clermont Charing Cross, London.

The Association Chair, Heather Glanville and Chief Executive Officer, Colin Slinn provided an update on the Association's membership and financial positions, as well as the progress the 3-year strategy is making in ensuring the long-term health of the Association. Several questions from members followed regarding the performance of the benefits our members enjoy, plus queries about our Leisure Properties, which Colin responded to.

Heather then announced the results of the Independent Council Member election, noting Trevor Warren as being elected for a 2-year term of office with a 48% share of the vote.

At the close of the meeting, Heather announced that she will be stepping down from the role of Association Chair for personal reasons. The CSMA Board have subsequently appointed the current Vice Chair, Gerard O'Sullivan as the Association Chair from the end of the 2023 AGM until the end of Heather's original tenure at the 2025 AGM. The CSMA Board have also consequently appointed Madeleine Grubb (previously the Club Leader) to the now vacant Vice Chair position at the same time.

As such, the Club Council were required to elect a new Club Leader. Geoff Gaunt has duly been elected to this role at the 1<sup>st</sup> November meeting, until May 2025 (Madeleine's original term of office). An election for the now vacant Club Treasurer role will take place in the coming weeks.



The Club Council met on the morning of the AGM and were joined by the Association Chair elect, Gerard O'Sullivan, Alan Swift, Leeds Group Chair (observing) and Rob Eagles, Boundless Events Manager who provided an update on the 2023 Member Events held and the plans for the 2024 programme.

There were no updates required from the Interest Group Leaders or Local Group Representatives, as the previous Council meeting had only been 6 weeks previous.

As outlined above, the election for a new Club Leader was confirmed as Geoff Gaunt who was elected un-opposed. The election for the now vacant Club Treasurer role will take place in the coming weeks from within the Club Council's number. Bob Thomas was also confirmed as an elected Local Group Representative for a further 3 years.

The 2024 Club Council meeting dates were also confirmed as the following: Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> February via Zoom, Wednesday 15<sup>th</sup> May in person, Thursday 5<sup>th</sup> September via Zoom, Thursday 31<sup>st</sup> October in person (with the AGM) and Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> December via Zoom.

## **Data Protection**

We've been asked to outline what are the key principles of data protection, which are then required to be applied to our policies and practice.

Article 5 of the UK GDPR sets out seven key principles which lie at the heart of the general data protection regime, of which you must consider when collecting and/or storing data.

 Lawfulness, Fairness and Transparency Processed lawfully, fairly and in a transparent manner in relation to individuals.
 Purpose Limitation

Collected for specified, explicit and legitimate purposes and not further processed in a manner that is incompatible with those purposes.

- Data Minimisation
   Adequate, relevant and limited to what is necessary in relation to the purposes for which they are processed.
- 4. Accuracy

Accurate and, where necessary, kept up to date; every reasonable step must be taken to ensure that personal data that is inaccurate, having regard to the purposes for which they are processed, are erased, or rectified without delay.

5. Storage Limitation

Kept in a form which permits identification of data subjects for no longer than is necessary for the purposes for which the personal data are processed.

#### 6. Integrity and Confidentiality

Processed in a manner that ensures appropriate security of the personal data, including protection against unauthorised or unlawful processing and against accidental loss, destruction, or damage, using appropriate technical or organisational measures.

#### 7. Accountability

The controller shall be responsible for, and be able to demonstrate compliance with, paragraph 1 of Article 5 (*Lawfulness, Fairness and Transparency*)

All Groups and event organisers should make themselves aware of the Data Protection Guidelines listed in the Club Handbook and of course report any concerns or issues to the Member Communities team in a timely manner.

## **Groups Networking Meeting – Feedback**

On the 10<sup>th</sup> October, 42 members met at Weetwood Hall in Leeds for the third of the 2023 Networking Meetings. The topics for this meeting mirrored those of the previous two Networking Meetings in Edinburgh and Tunbridge Wells held earlier in the year.

Membership: The presentation and subsequent discussions covered what's included in Boundless Membership, with a focus on the 4 core products (Kew Gardens, WWT, Tastecard and Kids Pass), plus how members can discover more on the Boundless website. It was also explained who is eligible to join Boundless and the best methods for signing up members.

The current Eligibility statement was confirmed as the following:

'If you currently work, have previously worked or have retired from a publicly funded organisation, you can join Boundless. This includes civil-service departments, even those under private-sector contracts, as well as public-sector employers like the NHS, armed forces, emergency services, education, government agencies, and local authorities.

Members can also invite their immediate family and eligible colleagues to join Boundless membership.'

The meeting also discussed the need for an induction pack aimed at both encouraging new volunteers, but also supporting our existing Volunteers/Committee members – this was agreed to be a good idea and will be developed by the Member Communities team in conjunction with the Club Council.

All three meetings discussed the best practice for holding their events. These discussions focussed on two key questions:

#### What are the requirements of a good venue?

Responses included...... safe & easy parking, easy access to building, good lighting, warm and comfortable, good transport links/access, clear directions/obvious location, decent refreshments, good toilets, established presentation facilities (screen/projector, etc.) and a dedicated space for the Group to meet and socialise.

#### What is good practice for hosting an event?

Responses included..... sending out an email reminder 5-7 days before, asking someone to meet and greet at the event whilst another member could be collecting attendees details for future communications, identifying and then 'buddying up' a new attendee, ensuring you promote the next few events during the event and consider sending a follow up email thanking everyone for attending after the event.

Thanks again to all those members who attended and contributed at these meetings.


