

Although these notes are being written towards the end of June, they are for July and that means we are into the second half of the year. Where the first half went is beyond me.

Club night in June saw an interesting talk by Trica Thompson about the 1940s, '50s', '60s' and '70s'. Perhaps the time when most of us grew up in. Yes, I can remember the Mods and Rockers, and in fact one of the first concerts I went to, was to see The Who just after they had released Quadrophenia. I also remember the winter snow of 62/63. It snowed on New Years' Eve and continued throughout January. My pupils were always amazed when I used to tell them that we did not miss a single day of school. We were tough in them days.

This was followed by six of us enjoying a game of Pitch and Putt, which I found a lot better than watching eleven Englishmen run around trying to win a game of football.

Turning to this month, our club night is a talk by Paul Baker on The Battle of Barnet. This will be followed by an extra event, when we shall be enjoying an evening Fish and Chip cruise on the River Lee from Broxbourne. Finally, towards the end of the month we shall be going to Ware for our annual light heated game of Pétanque, and afterwards enjoy a light hearted drink in the pub next door. Re-starting the museum visits, at the beginning of June I went to the Natural History Museum, to visit the extra exhibition on Birds. Well worth it. It started with a small history of the evolution of them. Yes, they were descended from dinosaurs, but some species were around before that. As I went through the exhibition, I realised that birds are more intelligent than you think. To say somebody is "bird brained" does not mean that they are useless. In fact, to attract a mate, the male of one group of birds have been known to use a stick as a drum. In a short video this male is happily drumming away, and the female looking on is most likely thinking, "I wish you would stop that infernal racket." In another video, there is a film of a peregrine falcon diving, reaching speeds of over one hundred miles per hour, and as it pulls out and you can only imagine the G forces that it must overcome.

Finally at the end I finished in a quiet bit where you just listened to the chorus of bird sounds. Time for lunch, so I had a chicken sandwich...

I watched the twenty-four-hour racing from Le Mans and must mention a couple of incidents. CAR PARKING IN BROXBOURNE RIVERSIDE, EN10 6TD

Access from M25 and A10. Take junction 25 off the M25 on to the A10 and follow signs to Hertford/Cambridge. Broxbourne is located off the A10. Take the A1170 exit and follow signs to Broxbourne. In the town centre at the traffic lights, just passed The Bull, take a right turn on to the B194, Station Road, and keep going on to Nazeing New Road. Keep going but then turn right into the Broxbourne Riverside car park entrance and park in the first car park on your right adjacent to the recycling centre. Parking is free after 18.00, but before this it is free for two hours.

The "Lady of Lee Valley" DOES NOT pick up at Boat Centre in Old Nazeing Road and the above post code will only give an approximate location.

Boules are made of metal (Usually Steel) and held in the palm of the hand. They are thrown at the Jack (the target ball) with the palm of the hand held downwards then the throw is an under arm swing ending with an upward flick of the wrist, this puts a back spin on the Boule providing more control and accuracy.



Please come along especially newcomers. There will be someone on hand to help those new to the game. Anyone who would like to have a meal afterwards can give their order to me, menus will be available before play so Chris (Pub Manager) can have our food ready by close of play usually between 8-8.30.

Please be aware the adjacent car park charges are up to 8 pm now so please meet just after 6-30 pm so you only need to pay for 1 hour (this includes half an hour free parking). SCARBOROUGH REUNION

Following the aborted attempt to restart the Group Weekends after Covid, several members decided to have an impromptu meeting at Bournemouth in September 2022, although nine of us were in three different hotels. In the evenings, we all did meet in the bar of one and as a result of discussion we all reconvened in April this year.

Mick suggested using an Alfa hotel and whilst initially booked for Whitby, this was changed to Scarborough. Although there were four coaches also at the hotel, the staff were quite efficient and managed to cope by having staggered meal times. The Cumberland overlooks the Valley to the rear of the hotel so there is a great view across the town and being near to South Cliff the panorama is across the Bay to the harbour and Castle.



There should have been entertainment every night but the first night was cancelled so most of us went walking off the substantial meal before spending the rest of evening in a local hostelry where there was entertainment.

Eight of us decided to use our old codgers passes to visit Whitby by bus so we could appreciate the magnificent scenery but it was a tortuous road for a large vehicle with steep gradients which tested the drivers skills – Brian and June went by car and had the misfortune to suffer a flat tyre.

At Robin Hoods Bay six of us alighted at the top for a 20 minute walk down a very steep, narrow and twisting access road for the town to the bay.

As there was over an hour to wait for a Whitby train, we adjourned for a coffee to an adjacent pub but lingered too long and the level crossing gates had closed.

Thus, we did not hear the station announcements and boarded by mistake the train that was going back to Pickering and sat there as we watched the Whitby train leave!

Sadly, it was too cold in the northeast wind so I took this photo of 1933 built 'Poseidon' that has been with North Bay since 2006 (you may have come across it at Woburn when it was masquerading as Flying Scotsman) on the turntable before returning direct.

Grass Autotest Season Good news, we have the use of a new venue for our autotests, but unfortunately, we can't get on it until the grass has been cut for hay. This will take place early in July, so we have put in dates for three events, starting on Sunday 28th July. There may be a chance to use a different part of the field earlier in the year, but that option won't be available until next year. Regs are now available from the website.

Alternative Grass Autotest Season Blackbird AC are running a series of five grass autotests this year at their venue on the A5, just north of Towester. They are all on a Saturday, except the last one, where it is a double header weekend with a BBQ and camping available overnight.

12 Car Rally Season The 12 Car Rally dates for this season, due to the January event being the most likely to be hit by bad weather, the events will now run in Nov, Dec, Feb and Mar. The existing January event has moved to Nov and the existing April event to Dec, with the existing February and March events staying as is. This also allows for the two uses of the John Bunyan PH start to be better separated. The December event, as Blackbird have moved their event forward a week (most likely to miss the Preston Rally weekend), will now run on 29th November instead, but that is still four weeks from the previous event.


