ROBERT'S RAMBLEINGS

August is here and as we head towards the end of the summer; I wish I knew where it has gone. July club night was a talk on the Battle of Barnet, part of the Wars of the Roses. Well explained with slides and an excellent speaker. This was followed a week later by our Fish and Chip trip on the River Lee from Broxbourne. We could not have chosen a better night for it, as it was a pleasant evening. Ah that was our summer. They even served the food on a plate with proper knives and forks. We even managed to have ice cream for afters. Thank you to me. This was followed a week later by our annual game of pétanque, and ten of us enjoyed two games of throwing boules.

So, what does August hold for us. Well for club night, John will be treating us to yet another of his excellent music evenings. This will be followed by us returning to The Galley Hall for an evening meal, and details can be found in the article in this newsletter. Doing more of our own visits in London, and this month we first decided to visit The Globe Theatre which is located on the South Bank of The River Thames. Arriving a bit early for our time slot we started to go round the exhibition, before meeting up for our tour. We were given headphones and a wireless so we could listen to the guide. Moving through the theatre, we stopped outside and were given a history of the theatre. It is the third one to be built, and it is not on the original site, as in Shakespeare time the Thames was a lot wider, and we would be standing in muddy water if it was its original width. Moving inside we sat in the theatre in complete silence. No mobiles were to be used for filming as the actors on the stage were rehearsing. With no roof on the theatre, it was rather warm, another summers day. After some time, we moved down to the outside, before finishing the tour in the gift shop. After that we finished off the exhibition, before going for lunch.

The next visit was to Apsley House which can be found by Hyde Park Corner. It is the home of Duke of Wellington and his dependence. Upon entering we descended to a small room, where a history of the Duke could be found, from his birth to his death. His coffin was supported on an iron frame a made from guns captured at the Battle of Waterloo. Returning to the ground floor and picking up headphones so we could listen to the audio description of each room, off we went. Entering each room, we were given a talk of what exhibits were on display. Although some of the exhibits were gifts from grateful heads of state for his victory at Waterloo, a lot were purchased by the Duke himself. One room does contain portraits of Napoleon, although the two never meet face to face. Whilst looking at a picture of the Battle, the audio quoted the Dukes' famous saying, "that next to a battle lost, the worse site is that of a battle won." I wonder how many commanders in World War One said that. I must mention the following. In the great dining room, where each year on the anniversary of the battle was commemorated, the windows were covered not with blinds, but with mirrors. Each one could be pushed up to let the light in, but when dinner was served, they were pulled down to reflect the candle light. Finally, ninety minutes later, we finished and went for lunch. We chose a pub in Whitehall just south of Trafalgar Square. When we finished the traffic in Whitehall was hardly moving, and the Square was gridlocked. We went home via the Underground.

Well, that is all for this month. So, keep safe.

NEL Clubnight - 10 September

Lynton and Lynmouth Flood – talk by **Phil McKinder**.

On 15th August 1952 around 1700 people were staying in Lynmouth, North Devon, many of them on holiday in the fine Hotels and Guest Houses. What they experienced that night was a shock to the nation and around the world. The flood was one worst incidents of its kind to have ever occurred in Britain.



Phil will explain the cause, resultant damage and what has been done to ensure the disaster never happens again.

Phil is himself a Boundless member who has many interests which includes music, he is an accomplished guitarist; railways; canals, he owns a canal boat; and he is an official guide to the Copped Hall Trust, some of you may remember he gave us a talk and guided tour of the Hall. He gives a number of interesting talks, most of his fee for these goes towards the Trust.

Phil's most recent talk to us took the form of trial based on the 1931 murder trial of William Wallace where the audience had to decide on whether he was guilty or not.

24 September – Visit to NUTHAMPSTEAD AIRFIELD MUSEUM at: THE WOODMAN, SG8 8NB

Most of you will be aware that the northern part of our NEL area coincides with the part of East Anglia most associated with the airborne warfare waged by this country and her allies in the determined efforts to defeat the tyranny of Nazi Germany. Last year a group of Nellies visited Duxford air museum and a few months ago visited nearby 1 Fowlmere Airfield, which has a far smaller but still very interesting museum dedicated to the WWII heroes who were based there.



This has led me to organise a NEL visit to Nuthampstead Airfield Museum, an American base a few miles south of Duxford, which I am sure will be equally worthwhile. Because the museum is in the grounds of the Woodman pub, the visit will be combined with one of our monthly pub meals. In fact, the Woodman was the Americans' "local" and the pub itself has its own distinctive atmosphere, with the WWII memorabilia on its walls.



The museum's mission is to provide a facility for public education on the roles of the 8th Air Force 398th Bomb Group and 55th Fighter Group, especially their activities and roles in the national defence whilst at Station 131. The aim do this through is to programme of engagement with the visitor, where storytelling and interaction are at the heart of the museum experience.

Through the varied exhibits you will learn veterans' stories, not only with a historical perspective, but on a personal level too. Many of the artefacts at the museum compliment those stories, along with items found on the airfield itself and identified later. Voluntary monetary contributions to the museum from visitors are obviously much appreciated.

The visit will take place on 24 September, starting at 12.30. Please e-mail me by 20 September if you would like to join us.

RETURN TO DERBYSHIRE

Many moons ago the Group had a self-Chesterfield drive break in Wetherspoons' Portland Hotel, named after a Duke of the same name as part his plan for the Lancashire, Derbyshire and East Coast Railway. Unfortunately, the Railway did not reach either ends of the proposed termini so failed and the Hotel is all that remains as Market Station and tracks have long disappeared. Conversely, St Mary's Church has survived some 700 years longer despite its twisted spire, caused, it is believed, by a combination of use of unseasoned timber and heavy slates.



Last month I made a return visit but travelled by express coach and used local buses so did not have the hassle of find a parking space or of how to pay for it and had the bonus of admiring the scenery, often from a top deck. The X17 route runs from Sheffield through Chesterfield to Matlock and beyond on alternate journeys and also connects with the Trans Peak Derby to Buxton service. There are also Peak Sightseer open-top, hop on/hop off bus services to Chatsworth House, through Hope Valley to Castleton and spectacular Winnats Pass and another circular one via Bakewell. Sadly my camera ran out of juice on these trips.



Camera recharged, I was able to record my visit to the Heights of Abraham at Matlock Bath, so called as Benjamin Brian thought his newly acquired 60acre site was similar to those in Quebec scaled by General Wolfe in 1759. Although 169metres high, the Heights have several caves, some natural caused by water erosion of limestone rock and others by mining for lead and sodium crystals. By 1847 the caves had been worked out so Benjamin developed a Georgian pleasure garden and ex-miners gave tours.

The venue became popular with the wealthy and donkeys were used to take the gentry up the steep slopes, which included the then Princess Victoria and this Tower was built subsequently to commemorate her visit.

Following the coming of the railway vast numbers came on special trains from as far away as Birmingham but much rowdiness ensued.

Patronage steadily declined, mainly due to the difficulty in climbing up, as most did, 160metres of rough terrain until 1984 when a cable car was opened, which revitalized the venue and enabled facilities to be updated. There are spectacular views through the Derwent Valley which leads to my next visit in the village of Cromford.



In 1771, Richard Arkwright built his first water powered spinning mill at Cromford that transformed the cotton spinning process from a cottage to manufacturing industry and the original building is seen here. Now preserved, the whole complex is a World Heritage Site. Other mills were built nearby using the waters from the River Derwent and another of Arkwright's mills, Masson Mill, built in 1783 was operational until the 1990's is also preserved.





Arkwright provided houses for his workers and the first 27 were built in North Street, with 16 on top and 11 on bottom. It is a marvel that after 100 or more years these buildings of the Georgian and Victorian eras are still standing whilst modern buildings are falling apart in less than 50.

My next journey was a long trip on Trans Peak bus through Bakewell to Buxton, a spa town with many fine buildings of the 18th and 19th Century – The Crescent, Pump Room, Opera House (pictured here) and Devonshire Dome and Palace Hotel, which was requisition by the Government inWW2.

Buxton has its own micro-climate – anyone remember the date 2 JUNE 1975 when an inch of snow fell and stopped a county cricket match?



My mother, evacuated during WW2, loathed the winters there when snow falls were measured in feet not inches due to enormous drifts that isolated the town. Being a teleprinter operator, she had the heartbreaking task of preparing telegrams informing local families that one of their number would not be coming home or who were missing in action.

I did not partake of the spa waters but came near with a visit to Buxton Brewery Tap with an ale named 'Right to Roam'. This commemorates the famous mass trespass by walkers over the moorland plateau of Kinder Scout in April 1932 that the landed gentry forbade public access to so they could have exclusive right for shooting. The wave of sympathy for the jailed leaders kick started a campaign that led to formation of National Parks after the War – so I raised a glass or two to that.

Past Events

There were 21 entries, with 19 starters, and everyone seemed to have a good time. We will be able to use it one more time this year, but unfortunately, it isn't going to be a replacement site for our whole season.

Future Events

Paddock Autotest We will be returning to the Greenacres site for this event, thanks to the landowner agreeing to one more visit. Regs are now available from the website. This will have two permits again, one for passengers and one without and is held on a grass field. Nice easy all-forward tests are on offer and are suitable for your standard car. Entry fee is £28 (juniors £15) and entries and marshals can register on the website links shown in the advert.

Chiltern Autotest With us back to looking for another permanent venue, it might be that we can source a couple of different ones and spread the use out, to keep the ground in a better condition over the year. We might be able to go to our original venue for this year, but again it is not going to allow us the early usage we would like for a full season.

12 Car Rally Season The 12 Car Rally dates for this season, due to the January event being the most likely to be hit by bad weather, the events will now run in Nov, Dec, Feb and Mar. 
