The Galley Hall building dates back to 1374 when it was then a farmhouse known as "Collewelle Haw", but by 1765 its name had evolved to the "Galley Hall". The Galley Hall became a Beer House during the 1830's being kept by one Benjamin Logsdale. The deeds were conveyed to Christie and Cathrow Brewers of Hoddesdon in 1837. Bringing us up to date the Pub has been extended in character to provide an extra Function Room and Patio area providing comfortable dining etc




The day was very warm so we were pleased to see so many mature trees along the paths giving us welcome shade.

### The Italian Job Experience

Thank you Owen for your insight into Harrington coaches, ALR 453B in particular. It prompted me to share my Italian Job experience of 2 years ago.

As a birthday treat, the family gave me a voucher for this experience organised by Car Chase Heroes ( <a href="https://www.carchaseheroes.com">https://www.carchaseheroes.com</a>) and our David's wife's family did the same for her dad, Peter, so we could enjoy the day together.

Not being superstitious, we booked for Friday 13<sup>th</sup> May 2022 at Elvington, near York and arranged to stay the night before at a hotel beside the A1 with our spouses, Kathy and Anne. Kathy and I took the opportunity to book an Air B&B in Yorkshire for the following week to explore Herriot and Heartbeat country.

Guess what? A week before the 13<sup>th</sup> we had a message that the event was cancelled - a mix up over the venues! So, we had to find an alternative date.

However, Kathy and I kept our original accommodation bookings and thoroughly enjoyed a relaxed time touring around Yorkshire.

### 14th August, Tockwith, west of York.

Peter and I arrived at 2.30 pm, just on our booked time, after being driven here by David through slow heavy traffic on the A1. We had to join a lo-o-ong queue out in the hot sun for signing on - their computer had gone down at lunchtime and all was delayed.

Not a good start but we were eventually called to sit in the paddock area and await the first car instructor who would sit alongside whilst driving three laps around the old airfield peri track. The Italian Job experience begins at last.

As there were so many people signing up for a drive on the day and the whole operation had been delayed, once in a car the experience was intense as the instructors had to get through their list of drivers (many having to endure 50 sessions in the day) as quickly as they could. No time for detailed discussion.

#### Mini Cooper S

Hmm. What a stark interior; a brief briefing and hurried start up then told to gun it along the right hand side of the track to allow other cars to pass on the inside; check mirror Oh! can't see in any mirrors. The instructor uses them and tells you when it's safe to move over. That was the hardest part of the afternoon, not to be able to check for myself.



So, after negotiating the first 90 left bend, I was told to accelerate hard until he advised to brake before the sharper 90 left corner, where I could see some spectators looming up ahead; braked hard - but a slow response and I found a risk of my feet slipping off the pedals as they had no rubbers - it was a hairy moment!

After the first two laps, I began to settle in. At the end of the third lap we pulled into the paddock and I stood on the brakes to bring the Mini to a halt.

The instructor scribbled a brief comment on my record card about my drive: "Good start"

### E-type Jaguar

An instructor was frantically beckoning me to the car. Getting in and out all day to engage with the next driver was obviously too much effort from the cockpit of an E-type!

Dropping into the seat, with some difficulty, the smell of petrol was distinct but we were off in a hurry for a quicker ride that needed more muscle power to control the beast. Again, this was stripped out and with a roll cage, prepared for track work.

But it's a blue coupe model! This was a far cry from the smooth sedate ride with the top down that I'd envisaged and looked forward to for weeks in advance, remembering the lovely open top car in the film. [after its 'destruction' in the film E-type 848 CRY was restored and is now In good care]

Finally, an instructor called me and we walked across to my last ride. Wow, that looked more like it. Top down and shining in the sunlight was a silver Aston Martin DB9.

A three lap cruise in this would have been bliss, but, again, I was egged on to drive fast. Once used to the gear changing it was a joy to drive. Improving each lap, my last of the day left me with a smile to my face as I changed down and slipped through the chicane without lifting off.

Wouldn't mind driving this one home!

So, what's this DB to do with the Italian Job? Well, nothing really.

My third experience should have been being driven in a Mini, as passenger, up the ramp into the rear of the Italian Job coach but the coach was u/s on the day with gearbox failure so I had to choose an available car from the 30 or so that had been brought along instead. I'd chosen the DB9.

The coach sat forlorn some distance away from the action. It wears plate ALR 453 B but looks different to the photos of the Harrington - over to you, Owen?

Browsing the website, I came across <u>www.theitalianjobminis.com</u> that's well worth a look, having info on filming of The Italian Job, some of the people involved and pics of the replica Minis that they built [that can be booked for an experience].

The ghost of ALR453B lives on here too as they are painstakingly restoring a Harrington Legionnaire to replicate the Italian Job coach and they hope to complete it for the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the original film in 2029.




