Good King Robert's Trip to Prague

Having overcome my fear of flying, this year I decided to go away for the Christmas festivities. Over the years I have always said that I would like to spend Christmas in Prague, and so this year off I went. Arrived at Heathrow Airport, checked in, I walked around the terminal looking for other members of our group. Nobody in site and so onto the plane I went. It was here that I found the others in our group. Off we went above the clouds before we landed at Prague. Through Passport, collected my bag, then walked out to find the courier waiting for us, before boarding our coach which took us to our hotel, located in the centre of Prague just of the main square. Unpack, dinner, few drinks and to bed.

Next day we started with a walking sightseeing trip around Prague. This included looking and watching the famous Wenceslas Clock. Hope my video of it in motion will be fine. Prague is not a large city, so it was easy to walk around, so it to see everything. Also, a lot of the buildings are old because unlike a lot of the Cities in Europe, it was not bombed by the Allies. Stepping onto Charles Bridge our courier told us to make a wish at the centre stature. I wished I would win the lottery, but to no avail. This was followed by a lunch time cruise on the river. The afternoon was free for us to wander around the city, before the traditional festive Christmas Eve meal.

Christmas Day, onto the coach and a trip the castle. The castle itself was closed but the grounds and courtyards were open for us to walk around. Another video of them changing the guard. The castle was at the top of the hill, hence the reason for the coach ride, but our courier gave a guided walk back to the Old Town. The afternoon was free for us to wander. Having carried out their attempt, they sought refuge in a church but were betrayed to the Germans. Rather than be captured they all committed suicide. The next day was a full day excursion to Cesky Krumlov in South Bohemia. Firstly, we all visited a Christmas market, even though it was Boxing Day, in Ceske Budejovice before we continued to Krumlov for a walking tour followed by a pre-booked lunch. The afternoon was free and by now I was thinking that it is time to buy something for the holiday. I finished up with two crystal glasses, and does the wine taste good out of them. Yes. Back to Prague for dinner, before a wander into the square to look at the clock.

The last day came and there was an optional excursion to Kozel where we had a trip round the brewery. This was followed by a little light exercise. We pushed to coach to jump start it. Afterwards we went on to Kutna Hora for lunch before a short, guided tour of the town. Returning to the hotel our evening meal was at a local brewery and followed afterwards by a last visit to the clock.

Soon Saturday came and it was time to come home. A short but precise thank you on the coach by yours truly for our courier, whose commentary's I personal enjoyed, and a very smooth coach driver. This was followed by a round of applause.

REMINISCENCES - by Owen Woodliffe

Recently I was travelling along Green Lanes at Palmers Green and noticed that The Fox had reopened following a long period of refurbishment.

At the rear in Fox Lane there is a new block of flats where the old banquet hall used to be and I recall that in the 1970's NEL had a dinner/dance there. In those glory days of Nelly some 80 to 100 attended the annual dinner/dances, although this was the only one held there as the Group migrated north to hold these at Forty Hall, where Staff famously drove his Mini, by mistake, across the snow-covered and fortunately frozen pond.





I was reading 'Wetherspoon News' (guess where) when I saw that Tim Martin, the charismatic founder-chairman, used to live in Wood Green and mentioned that he served behind the bar of the Duke of Edinburgh in Mayes Road. This is where NEL had their Club Nights in an upstairs room lit by a bare bulb in the 1960's, although probably before the Martin era there as his own first pub opened in 1979 in Muswell Hill.

I spent Twixmas at the Alfa Travel Royal Hotel in Weymouth where Mick O'B had organized a Group weekend in 2015 when this was an SLG Group (Shearings) hotel. Mike Gannon and I with our spouses went to Dorchester by bus and on the journey saw that a pub had a real ale festival so on return Mike and I alighted early to sample the amber nectar. Rejoining the bus some time later Mike realized his reading glasses were missing – last seen when we were sitting on a row of straw bales in the pub courtyard. These were never found so perhaps they were munched by cows in the adjacent field.

Which brings me to another animal encountered on another Group weekend in the 1970's at Newtown in Powys. Then there was sufficient numbers to hire a coach which arrived there around midday. During an afternoon walkabout around town our former Chairman, Brian Bishop, found a butcher selling very reasonable lamb joints and arranged for these to be stored there until our Monday morning return. Brian gleefully told any of our party he met about this so there was an unscheduled stop on our return journey whilst said joints were loaded into the side lockers of the coach. A few miles outside Newtown we encountered a road block and a policeman entered and spoke to our driver before allowing us to continue. Ever curious, Brian asked our driver what it was all about and was informed there had been instances of sheep rustling in the area! Just as well the copper did not have a sniffer dog as we would have had some explaining to do – although doubtless Brian would have risen to the occasion!

Japanese Jaunt - 8 April 2024 – 2 May 2024

We had been hoping to visit Japan for some time, as it is the home of Jeanette's cousin Stephen and his Japanese wife Yuki. However, as we have never been east of Turkey, nor out of the UK for more than two weeks, we were beginning to wonder if we would ever make it. Well, we finally did so, which seems a good reason to pen a rare article for the Nelly Newsletter.

Firstly, we had to decide on our destinations. Tokyo, Kyoto - previously the capital - and Shiga prefecture - home of Steve & Yuki - were obvious candidates, but we wanted to see some different regions without imposing an overly onerous schedule on ourselves. Finally, we settled on adding Matsumoto, because it is in the midst of the area christened by Europeans as "the Japanese Alps"; and Matsuyama, because we wanted to travel beyond the principal island of Honshu, Matsuyama being the capital of Shikoku, the smallest of Japan's four main islands. We also decided to get Abbott Travel to book the hotels, but not to book the internal travel, so as to give ourselves a degree of flexibility. We accepted Steve's advice to use "Black Cat" couriers for our suitcases in respect of the internal journeys, which turned out to be an excellent decision.

We arrived in Tokyo in torrential rain which lasted for hours, obviously not creating a great initial impression. However, we enjoyed our second day, touring the Imperial Gardens and the Emperors' Shrine in perfect sunshine. Despite this, on the following day, we were happy to leave behind the cityscape of endless tower blocks and to head towards Matsumoto.

Actually, it took about an hour for the train to leave the city behind. After that, the typical landscape (in fact, for most of the rail journeys) was flat countryside, dotted with smallholdings and paddy fields, with hills / mountains in the distance. We also passed tea plantations on the lower slopes. The foremost attraction of Matsumoto is its marvellous castle – see photo below – which is one of the most renowned in Japan. The region is also famous for the Snow Monkey Park, which we much enjoyed, although unfortunately the monkeys only bathe in the hot springs during cold weather !

After four days, we travelled to Kyoto and quickly came to agree with the prevailing view that if you only have time to visit one city in Japan, this should be the one. The temples and shrines, including the parks and gardens in which they are set, really are extremely beautiful. It can be quite difficult for the western visitor to differentiate, but we concluded that if a shrine had statues of lions and foxes, it was probably Shinto and if a temple had a statue of Buddha it was obviously Buddhist. To complicate matters, the two religions often share the same site, and some Japanese people follow both religions. To complicate matters even more, you also see a surprising number of church buildings, but we were told that most of these are only used for white weddings and nothing else. We were also told that many Japanese are welcomed into the world with a Shinto ceremony, later on have a white wedding in church and finally a Buddhist funeral !

On leaving Kyoto, we had the most challenging land journey of the holiday, a 227 mile rail trip to Hiroshima on the Shinkansen bullet train, then half-way back on the same route, before changing for a three-hour journey on to the island of Shikoku so as to finally arrive at Matsuyama. If we had been in any other country, we would probably not have attempted this length of journey in one day, but in Japan we rightly trusted that every train, from the Shinkansen to the humblest single-carriage, would run exactly as timetabled. Visiting the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum was an extremely sombre experience, but it was heartening to see that the city has now become a vibrant regional centre. Moving on, we crossed to Shikoku via the lengthy rail bridge and, in doing so, left behind the large number

of fellow-westerners who had been alongside us at every destination up to now. From Matsuyama, we visited the unspoilt town of Uchiko, made prosperous by its vegetable wax industry about 150 years ago, and the tiny island-resort of Kashima, where we were virtually the only inhabitants for a few hours, possibly due to its being enveloped in sea-mist.

After four days, we re-traced some of our previous journeys and travelled to Steve and Yuki's home, just outside the pottery town of Shigaraki. From here, we enjoyed a day-trip to the ancient city of Nara, famous for its huge bronze Buddha and extremely tame deer. However, this was mainly a time of experiencing Japan at a more relaxed pace and enjoying Steve & Yuki's excellent hospitality. Our "bedroom" had actually been the house's tea room – there had been a hole in the middle of the floor where the tea was heated. The room still felt traditional – sliding doors, paper at the windows and mattresses on the floor. After six days, it was sadly time to wrap everything up – literally, as we spent the last afternoon helping Steve to price and wrap his pots in preparation for the pottery festival which was to start the following day. However, as he was leaving for the festival, we were starting our long journey home via Kyoto, Tokyo and finally Heathrow. There was just time to say a proper farewell to Kyoto by ascending the viewing tower just outside the city's huge station.


