

Christmas 2025 in Switzerland by Robert.

Having had a nice Christmas in Prague last year, 2024, I decided to do something similar for 2025. Deciding where to go was not a problem, Switzerland was top of my list, it was just which travel company to use. Due to recommendations, I chose One Traveller, which meant that all the booking was done over the phone, and not by a travel agent.

Day Zero:- Pre-Holiday Get Together.

As the flight departed on day one from Heathrow at 09.00, the company had arranged for overnight stay at the Radisson Blu Hotel, located on the Bath Road, near the airport. Arriving around 16.00, I was greeted by our Tour Manager, Jana Martinkova, collected my keys and found my room, before wandering down to the bar for a welcome drink at 18.15. Here I met most of my fellow travellers, before going into dinner to find my place, clearly located by my number. This system was used throughout the holiday, so you sat with different people each night at dinner. As the tour manager told us we are all getting an early morning alarm call at 05.15. I went to bed early.

Day One:- Travel to Adelboden via Zurich.

Waking up at some unearthly hour I wandered down for a good hearty breakfast, before a short mini cab ride to the airport. Passing through check-in, bag drop, security etc., I boarded the plane for a short flight of about 2 hours to Zurich. This was followed by a long queue to get through customs at Zurich, before boarding our coach for a three-hour ride to our hotel. We did have a stop half way. Arriving at the hotel, I made my way to my room, unpacked before a welcome drink in the bar. Armed with my camera I decided to take group photos, before going into dinner, which included another drink.

Day Two:- Berne.

This was a full day trip to Berne. The coach arrived at the Bear pit. This has now been improved to give the bears a larger area, and a lot of photographic opportunities followed. The group was then split into two groups, for guided walking tour round the city. This included their clock complete with moving puppets. The home of Einstein was also pointed out. We returned to the hotel for coffee and cake, before dinner and included drink.

Day Four:- Zermatt and Matterhorn.

This day started with a coach trip to Fruitigen. We then continued our trip by train to Visp, before changing onto the Glacier Express to Zermatt. Here we changed onto the Gornergrat Mountain Railway, a cog railway which gave fantastic views of the Matterhorn. Well, it would have done if the clouds had allowed it. A lunch with wine, all included, was enjoyed by the group, although we kept dashing outside when the clouds lifted to take photos of the Matterhorn. We returned to Zermatt and then the hotel for dinner and included wine.

Day Five:- Interlaken and Lake Thun Cruise.

Christmas Eve and a more relaxing day. Firstly, a coach drive to Interlaken, where we left the coach for a morning walking round the town on our own. Meeting our tour manager around 13.00 we walked to catch the boat for an afternoon cruise on Lake Thun, with coffee and cake included. It was too cold to stray outside. On reaching Thun, we changed to the coach and returned to the hotel. As usual, dinner with wine and included, but afterwards the hotel had laid on, outside, mulled wine around a bonfire. 20:20 Rallies These events are an intermediate style event between a 12 Car rally and a full night rally. The title refers to a maximum of 20 cars and 20 controls, and is usually held on a Saturday night and run for about 100 miles. The Blackbird AC one is on 14th February and will be reverting to full old school format with marshals and paper handouts, with food and drink at the finish. They are looking for some support from marshals.

Grass Autotests We still don't have a venue yet, but we are invited to all the Blackbird ones, which are held at Towcester.

12 Car Rally – A guide to the new format

- Any standard car can be used. Event limited to only 12 cars. Around a 45 mile route, timed at an average speed of 30mph. Friday evening, starting at 20:30, with the start/finish at the same location at a pub, for a social before and after the event.
- Novice class now split into **Semi-Expert** and **Novice** classes. **Expert/Semi-Expert/Novice** class based on navigators experience only. Expert/Semi-Expert class have to work out the route from navigation issued at controls around the route. Novice class will have the route issued before the start, so they can plot the navigation before leaving the start (and get help if required). Semi-Expert/Novice class have a more straight forward navigation style.
- Beginners class now called **RallyRun**, for anyone to use marked maps for as long as they like, which allows people to just enjoy doing the event. You can do all the same things as the other classes, but don't have to work out the route.
- Penalties are incurred for missing loops and booking in early/late at time controls. Time recording and route checks are done using a Smart Phone and the Timing App, which give notice when approaching a control/check, so you know you are on the right route.


