First things first, let's go back to last month when we were transported by Robert to two glorious destinations with a presentation about his trips and experiences in Canada and Switzerland. Do not worry as there were museum staff to help if required. Finally, we reached the end and made for the exit via the gift shop. This was followed by Fish and Chips at a local pub. **February 12 Car Rally** Well there was a bit of water about, correction, there was a lot of water about. With seven crews setting out, all was going well until most crews seemed to have stopped, on the App results, and shortly afterwards we got a call from one of the crews to say they were in a traffic jam on the A10 and they could see blue lights up at the next junction. They all managed to eventual get out, but by then most were running late and had to cut a chunk out, which left us with the decision to call the event results after only two thirds. Car one got through just before the accident and managed the whole route. Typical isn't it, if it isn't emergency road works, it is an accident on the half mile of A road we used!

#### 12 Car Rally – A guide to the new format

- Any standard car can be used. Event limited to only 12 cars. Around a 45 mile route, timed at an average speed of 30mph. Friday evening, starting at 20:30, with the start/finish at the same location at a pub, for a social before and after the event.
- Novice class now split into **Semi-Expert** and **Novice** classes. **Expert/Semi-Expert/Novice** class based on navigators experience only. Expert/Semi-Expert class have to work out the route from navigation issued at controls around the route. Novice class will have the route issued before the start, so they can plot the navigation before leaving the start (and get help if required). Semi-Expert/Novice class have a more straight forward navigation style.
- Beginners class now called **RallyRun**, for anyone to use marked maps for as long as they like, which allows people to just enjoy doing the event. You can do all the same things as the other classes, but don't have to work out the route.
- Penalties are incurred for missing loops and booking in early/late at time controls. Time recording and route checks are done using a Smart Phone and the Timing App, which give notice when approaching a control/check, so you know you are on the right route.


